






Alhampton Weather – September 2025

The pressure chart below from the last day of August illustrates the end of the stable weather that predominated for nearly six months. This very deep depression brought high winds and heavy rain to the whole country for the first few days of September and was a perfect calling card for the arrival of Autumn. Hurricane Erin and Tropical Storm Fernand making their way into mid Atlantic both contributed to a destabilising of the Jetstream and the arrival of a period of unstable and wet weather. Hurricane Gabrielle followed later in the month to keep the instability going.

Nationally September was a very wet month. Some parts of Cumbria had nearly double the long term average, but locally the effect was less so. Also the temperature was slightly below the average, though with a lot of warm sunshine, more than normal for the month, that seems surprising. As the month progressed the situation settled and we had a period with the Jetstream forming an elbow around the UK fending off the Atlantic depressions.

Looking ahead high pressure is expected to build and produce some relatively mild, dry weather with a good dose of sunshine. That are some doubts as to when this will break down, but we might expect periods of strong winds and rain becoming more prevalent by the first week of November. At least the remainder of October looks mainly sunny and dry.

The Natural World

Somebody asked me recently how long it takes me to write my nature notes each month, and the answer didn't come easily, because it all depends on a number of issues. Sometimes it can take all day, and on other occasions it is made easy for me.

September 26th was one of those days when it all became too easy. We were on an early autumn jaunt to Brittany for a few days and I thought that I could be sure to capture a photograph or two for this article. As climate change, global warming (call it what you will) takes hold, global populations of certain species are moving northwards, and it is now relatively easy to spot the enormous Atlantic blue fin Tuna, which can reach weights of 680kg (1500lbs), and certain species of whale are becoming more numerous off our coasts too. I wasn't looking for tuna or whales, but given that I am a beekeeper, and that the invasive Asan hornet, which preys almost entirely on honeybees, is slowly but surely, establishing a foothold in this country, I decided to seek one or two out. These hornets are, as their name suggests, native to the far east, but a fecund queen (look that one up), can – and did, start a whole new population.



Back in 2017, when they were still a bit of an enigma in the UK, I had taken a photo of one collecting nectar from an ivy bush in Roscoff, and just a few hundred metres from the ferry-port. 'Let's go there then'. And so we did, and we certainly saw an Asian hornet. Well, actually, quite a few. Numbers seem to have increased dramatically in the intervening eight years, and this photo was relatively easy to get.

Not only were they on the predictable ivy bush, but could be spotted flying around the harbour area of Roscoff. Fair enough, we thought, we knew there were a few in Roscoff, but 15 miles inland in the market town of Morlaix, where we were staying, we sat in the newly created seating area of the main square, where planting had been taken to a new level, and there they were abundant, buzzing picnicers and visiting all the late flowering municipal planting.

Is this all relevant to us in the UK. Yes, it most certainly is. Since 2004 these pesky (non-native) creatures have



decimated the beekeeping industry in France, but perhaps most importantly they have also caused great damage to the populations of other species of bees. Bumble bees and smaller solitary bees have been greatly affected. The first report of a single Asian hornet in England, was in Tetbury in 2014. It had obviously hitch-hiked on a tourist's car or caravan. This year, nearly 500 nests have been discovered, manly in Kent and West Sussex, but also in Hampshire and Dorset. A single hornet was even found on the Scilly Isles.

At this time of year, there will still be one or two queen hornets looking for sustenance on ivy bushes, then they will seek somewhere to hibernate, and next year they will start a brand new colony, producing several hundred off-spring. Please keep a look out, and if you see one report it, preferably with a photo, to the Non Native Species Secretariat (NNSS) at https://www.nonnativespecies.org/non-native-species/species-alerts#Species 53.

What are the differences between our European hornet and the Asian invader? Our hornet is bigger – up to 35mm (1½") whereas the Asian hornet struggles to reach 25mm (1") in length. The photo opposite shows an Asian hornet, which is primarily black, with that striking orange band towards its rear end, whereas ours is chestnut brown and yellow at the front end and yellow and black towards the rear end. We really need to keep an eye out for the Asian hornets, but nobody will object if you get it wrong.





Is that all? Well, actually no. I'm the one who is supposed to notice things when I'm out and about, but sitting, eating our picnic on the banks of the Morlaix river, my wife asked 'What are those white birds scything the water with their beaks?' They were a long way off, but it sounded for all the World as though they could be spoonbills. Out with the binoculars, and sure enough, she had spotted a pair of very uncommon shore birds. A few have been recorded in northern France before, and they have returned to the UK after 300 years, and a few pairs breed in Norfolk and Cambridgeshire.

The Wildlife Group Update

Traditional gardening vs Wildlife gardening:

Being a Wildlife gardener is not always the easy option.

My mantra is "take a relaxed view to garden tidiness" to allow Wildlife some space to live. This might be to allow some longer grass with weeds/wildflowers in it to flower for pollinators, and plants to seed for birds, some ivy under trees as cover for over wintering insects or flowering up a fence for pollinators, some stacked stones in a sunny spot or a log pile in shade (lots of benefits, amphibians, birds, insects et al) and definitely some corrugated iron or roof felting lying around for a Slow-worm home.

Being a trained gardener, I know how to garden in a traditional way, but sometimes I struggle with the consequences of Wildlife gardening. The other day I had a rush of compost envy when I visited Charles Dowding's lovely plot. The boxed clippings from the grass had no flowers to spread seed into the brewing compost, because of regular mowing. The clippings were ideally layered evenly over some



wood chip, and it got me thinking of my own compost heap.

In the Summer we generate a lot of green material for the compost, (last month you may have noted that Charles was saying ¾ greens to ¼ brown material) and in the Winter it tends to be the other way round. Especially if you are leaving seedheads for birds and architectural form. A good trad gardener, cuts down plants as soon as they have done their thing, be that for food or flower. For instance, flowers and many vegetables have prolonged flowering or cropping if you snip away at them (deadheading Roses and bedding or harvesting cut and come again lettuce or broccoli). In wildlife gardening I leave my brassicas to flower creating early food for pollinators in the Spring, and in the Summer, I leave many flowers to set seed for the birds to enjoy. But here's



the rub, do I have lots of seeds in the compost, or should I not compost those plants? Maybe Charles would argue that if I was a better compost maker and turned my heap three times in a year the seeds would not be a problem. No doubt he's right, I'll have to try harder. But the benefits of allowing wildlife into your space are many, be generous to them.

Mendip Hills Hash House Harriers Visits FTN Area

Every Monday the Mendip Hills Hash House Harriers (MH4) go for a hash run.

Hashing, in the context of running, started in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, in 1938. A group of British residents began meeting on Friday evenings to run in a similar way to the traditional British game of Hare and Hounds. One or two 'hares' would lay a trail using a trail marked by cut paper for the 'hounds' to find. Hashing ceased during the WW2, restarting afterwards but on Mondays.

Nowadays, there are hash runs all over the world. I did several hash runs with the Delhi Hash House Harriers in 1990 when I was there for a couple of months with work. Hashing has sometimes been described as "a drinking club with a running problem", showing what a social occasion it is.

These days the trail is laid with flour which is somewhat more environmentally friendly. However, the hares will also lay multiple false trails to mislead and slow down the faster runners. Typically, a hash run will be 4-5 miles.



On one of September's hashes, 52 of us met at Batch Farm in East Pennard. We followed footpaths, bridleways, tracks and the occasional road in the area prior to enjoying the Poutine laid on for us. Poutine is a Canadian (specifically Quebec) dish of French fries and cheese curds all smothered in hot brown gravy. We were well looked after by Batch Farm.

More recently in October, 38 hashers met at the Alhampton Inn. After the hash brief the trail laid by the hare (for this hash, me) led from the inn towards Ditcheat. Initially through Folly Drive, then north to take the back road through the village, passing The Manor, along Kite Lane before taking a footpath from near Barber's. The trail then led to and through Haddon Wood, now in pitch darkness



so head torches a necessity. The rope swing in Haddon Wood was extremely well used as can be seen. Finally, with the hash completed most hashers stayed for a drink or two in the recently CAMRA (Campaign for Real Ale) recognised inn.

One thing we all agree on - whether you run or walk we live in a lovely area.

Vegetable Gardening

The dull days of November are a launching pad for spring, an opportunity to set up your space for next year. Then you will find it so much easier to succeed next March and April, with new seeds and plants.



It's no good to step outside in spring and start from scratch at that point. You will find you're always behind throughout the year. Start now!

Broad beans and garlic excepted, it's too late to make new sowings and plantings, November is potentially a time of some abundance, but if you did not find time for those new plantings in summer, the vegetable garden can look empty and depressing.

If that is the case, there's probably a fair few weeds. Be on it! Either remove them by hand if there's not too many, or cover thick weeds with cardboard, then on top of that spread 5 cm compost of any kind. That could be old woodchip, well-rotted animal manure, or your own compost, even if imperfect looking. Old tree leaves work nicely at this time, even new ones if you have no leaf mould.

There is no need to sieve any of this because winter frosts will make the lumps open as they freeze. That leaves you with a lovely soft and even surface next spring, after you rake it shallowly in early March.

The soil of your pathways also will benefit from spreading organic matter of some kind. Paths are easier to maintain when they are weed free so again, lay cardboard and then just 2 cm woodchip on top, not too much. Preferably in small pieces, and it can be conifer wood, because that does not acidify soil. As fungal threads decompose the wood, soil below will benefit from its extra organic matter.





If you did find time for summer planting and weeding, you can be enjoying leeks, kale, cabbage, beetroot, parsnips, salads, beetroot and more. As beds become empty after harvests, straightaway spread compost 3cm readiness for spring. It will be here soon.

- 1. Spinach is frost hardy and is a top November harvest, from August sowing
- 2. Savoy cabbage 4 months in the ground, first big frost late November
- 3. Cardboard on paths and 10 cm old cow manure on beds with weeds smothered in November



Minutes of the Annual Parish Council Meeting on 11th September 2025.

PRESENT: Chairperson - Councillor Hutton (RH) and Councillors Clark (HC), Thring (CT), Annetts (PA), Evans (CE), Sergeant (PS), Adams (LA) and Pearse (RP).

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE - The Clerk had sent apologies for absence.

MENDIP SOUTH DIVISION COUNCILLOR REPORT - noted.

CODE OF CONDUCT – Declarations of interest on items included on the agenda – RH declared a disclosable interest in Item 155/25 c) as he is a neighbour.

MINUTES – of the meeting held on 31st July 2025 were approved.

MATTERS ARISING - from the meeting held on 31st July 2025.

Health and Wellbeing initiative – the Clerk had an online meeting with Community Health & Wellbeing Officer (CHWO) at SALC on 6th August. The main points, ideas or outcome from the meeting were as follows:

- ➤ To establish need within the parish, undertake a survey this can be done with help and support from CHWO at SALC.
- ➤ Contact Thrive (formerly Community Council for Somerset) to re-establish contact with Village Agent if the parish of Ditcheat has been allocated a village Agent. A Village Agent is likely to be aware of parishioners who may welcome support and can also assist in obtaining that support. This is in progress.
- Make contact with the Primary Care Network and Connect Somerset which covers Ditcheat, again to seek assistance with establishing if there are any parishioners who would welcome support from the community. This is in progress.
- ➤ Areas where need may be welcome could include: a 'Buddy Scheme' or befriending; a Warm Space provision; After School Support; Toy Library etc.
- ➤ The Parish Council needs to decide, if need is established, what it would be prepared to do to about meeting that need.

Resolved that Councillors would bring any suggestions to the next meeting. It was acknowledged that this would be an ongoing initiative.

Alhampton speed restriction invoice from Somerset Council - The Clerk reported that the invoice had still not been received.

Any matters not on the agenda – CE raised the matter of the acquiring of kissing gates which was dealt with under Item 160/25.

PLANNING

APPLICATIONS – the following planning applications were considered:

Variation of condition 2 - of planning approval 2024/0431/HSE (Two storey and single storey extension to detached dwelling.) to reduce depth and increase width of single storey extension, fenestration and internal reconfiguration). 1 Coronation Cottages, Sutton. Ref: 2025/1386/VRC. **Outcome:** Resolved to support the granting of permission on the grounds that the changes were not of any significant impact to warrant any further comment from the PC.

Full planning application - Proposed two GRP cabins installed on concrete plinths, 4m x 9m fenced compound enclosed by 2.4m palisade fencing, extension of the existing gravel access track, retention of hedging to the north and east, underground cabling works between the solar array and grid connection point. Land At 362530 135983 Smiths Lane Ditcheat Ref: 2025/1522/FUL. **Outcome:** to support the granting of permission on the grounds that the relocation of the cabins is a simple move and presents no concerns to the PC.

Conversion & extension of barn to self-contained tourism unit (Holiday let), Ox Barn, Wraxall. Ref: 2023/2341/FUL - noted that the applicant has appealed against the decision to refuse permission.

Higher Farm – the lack of clarity with regard to the activities that are taking place was discussed. RH and CE reported on the recent hearing for the variation of the licence to sell alcohol. The objections about traffic and noise which was raised at the hearing were not considered material to the licence application which was granted. RH further reported that he had met with the owners of Higher Farm, and the following points were made by the owners:

- ➤ The hospitality element of the business will close for the winter during which consideration will be given to whether and how to reopen the hospitality part of the business next year.
- > The outcome of their deliberations will be communicated to the Parish council and then the residents of Sutton.
- ➤ It was re-iterated that the focus of the business remained as agro ecology. The owners acknowledged during the meeting with RH that they were now aware of the issues within the village of Sutton

The Parish Council will monitor the situation and RH on behalf of the PC will continue to communicate with the owners of Higher Farm. Mendip South Division Councillors Claire Sully and Rob Reed had both been made aware of the concerns. The Clerk will follow up with the planning Department and Councillors Sully and Reed.

FINANCE

Balance of accounts – As of 31st August 2025 was £29,034.84. This includes a very generous donation of £100.00 from a parishioner, Mrs Lynne Hughes, for the Alhampton defibrillator fund and also a donation of £50.00 from the Alhampton Inn Quiz night again for the Alhampton defibrillator fund. The PC extends its thanks for these generous donations.

Approval of Parish Council payments for the following:

- 1) SLH Services Ltd for grounds maintenance in August £210.00.
- 2) Miss P Griffiths for Clerk's salary for period 1st July to 30th September 2025 £896.08.
- 3) HMRC for PAYE/NICs for period 1^{st} July to 30^{th} September 2025 £224.00. RESOLVED that the expenditure be approved, and the cheques issued. The increased cost per hour for hire of the Church Room to £7.50 per hour or part thereof from 1^{st} April 2026 was noted.

LCN SOUTH EAST — update from AGM — PS reported that there had been a presentation on Neighbourhood policing from the Community Policing team. There is a "street safe" app which can be downloaded and used if someone feels unsafe, it was suggested this be put on Facebook. The PSCO could visit the village to talk about online fraud. Parish preparedness was discussed. Parish Outline is a mapping tool — PS to find out if this is definitive. The next LCN meeting is in October.

PLAYGROUND - It was noted that it is planned that the work to reduce the tops of the 4 birch trees by approximately a third and raise the crowns will be done on Friday 24^{th} October.

Any matters of report — RP reported that there is an increase in the amount of dog waste fouling on the playground. The Clerk will investigate if the bin was moved from the Church steps to the playground would it still be emptied free of charge. RP also mentioned that there had been thanks for having the matting repaired and for the monitoring of playground. The Council thanked HC and RP. It was also noted that the path alongside the playground was being kept in good order. HC will monitor the use of the dog waste bin by the Church steps to ensure that if the bin is relocated that that does not cause an unintended consequence of dog waste being put in the general litter bin at that location. PC will then consider if an additional bin for dog waste sited at the end of Kite Lane is required. The Clerk will investigate resultant costs — i.e. purchase and emptying.

HIGHWAYS

Briefing note on the Volunteer Highway Scheme - this was discussed. All volunteers wishing to undertake any work on or near the highway need in the first instance to seek agreement from the PC. The PC then needs to obtain a licence from Somerset Council (SC). All volunteers will need to have completed the online Highway Safety Awareness course, received a certificate and have signed to state that they have read the Highway Volunteer Training Handbook. The PC will need to provide the appropriate level of insurance; obtain a licence from SC; check that volunteers have complied with the above. It was noted that the most likely area which would affect DPC was the annual litter pick. The risk assessment for the litter pick will need to consider the requirement to inform SC in advance and to assess specifically the risk on the stretch of road from Arthurs Bridge going towards Ditcheat.

Update on items/matters for repair previously reported. Grove Path resurfacing – on going. It was noted that the road on the corner opposite Folly Drive has been repaired. The problem of water pooling and the erosion of the side of road going towards Wraxall has, in the opinion of the PC, become a significant hazard. Despite a letter from Chris Barber to the Highways department and emails from the Clerk the Highways department have not classed this as a hazard but have listed it for repair. The Clerk will continue to raise the matter with the Highways Department.

New matters for report to the Highways department – The footpath outside the pub and round the corner is very uneven (as lorries are running over the kerb and edge of the pavement).

FOOTPATHS, BRIDLEWAYS AND RIGHTS OF WAY.

Update on the 'lost' path that runs behind Moff Motors towards Castle Cary station which would allow pedestrian access from Alhampton – RH to meet with the relevant landowners to discuss a way forward. The Clerk had advised that the Rights of Way would provide 3 kissing gates to be replace some of the stiles in the parish. The Clerk will liaise with CE about when they will arrive and where they will be stored.

GLASTONBURY FESTIVAL FEEDBACK – No comments had been received from parishioners on any issues or concerns arising from this year's festival. CT will request feedback from the traffic monitoring system that was in place during the festival period in preparation for briefing the relevant authorities.

The Four Winds by Kristin Hannah

The novel begins in 1921, describing a prosperous farming community in Texas. Elsa Wolcott, 25 years of age, was regarded by her family as unattractive and irrelevant and was resigned to spinsterhood.

A secret liaison with much younger Rafe Martinelli, led to pregnancy and disgrace. She was forced to marry and live with her husband's farming family. Determined to learn, Elsa worked hard and gradually won Rafe's parents respect and love although the relationship with her husband was a loveless one.



As the years passed farmers on the Great Plains of the US experienced a sixyear drought; powerful dust storms destroyed crops and killed livestock. The resulting agricultural depression contributed towards the Great Depression which affected the entire world. Staying on the farm with no sign of the drought ending, Elsa decided, as did over a million people, to leave with her two children to find a better life in California. Here the huge influx of migrants was regarded with hostility. The only employment to be found was cotton picking and the pickers became trapped into a vicious cycle of living on credit.

The strength and courage shown by Elsa, however, ensured the survival of her family. The book demonstrates how important friendship is and explores how the relationship Elsa had with her daughter changed. Kristin has written many novels; this one has encouraged us to read more!

Rector's Note

As I write, in early October, I am wondering whether you have been experiencing the incredible sight of the full moon over the last couple of nights. It was so bright the other night that I thought I had left a light on downstairs by mistake. But I gather it is also a Supermoon, or perigee moon, when the moon is at the closest point to earth in its orbit. When it happens in October, it's also known as the Hunter's Moon, as traditionally October was the month when hunters would gather meat and other food in preparation for the long winter months ahead. In many cultures, this moon has been regarded as a symbol of abundance, renewal and spiritual reflection, marking a time of balance between light and darkness. (Thanks to Google for all these details!)

So, as the nights draw in, but our daytimes remain incredibly sunny, I can only admire the balance and beauty of our world and how extraordinary it is in its detail. Our harvest services have helped us to think about how it is possible, for example, that every living thing on this planet could have developed in such minutely individual ways over the millennia.
