Alhampton Weather – August 2025

A summer to remember as the warmest on record. The average temperature for the three months was about 16°C, more than 1°C above the long-term average. I suspect that many of us will focus on how dry it was, but surprisingly we have had two equally dry summers, 2022 and 2024, in recent times. However, with an exceptionally dry spring preceding this summer we are well overdue for a lot of rain. The feature of the summer was record-breaking amounts of sunshine and a perpetual warmth, particularly at night, rather than extreme temperatures. The record for the longest heatwave goes back to 1976 and some comparisons of the two years have appeared in the press. It was an even drier summer in 1976.

August itself was quite an unsettled month. Storm Floris, hardly noticed in the south of the country, produced heavy rain and strong winds for the north. Nevertheless, the feeling of Autumn was apparent here by the end of the month. This is the time of the year for hurricanes and these can set off a pattern of wind and rain here as we slide into Autumn. Hurricane Erin in mid-month passed up the east coast of the USA in the process influencing the jetstream. As a consequence the stable, high-pressure conditions that we have enjoyed for nearly three months gradually declined. This has opened us up to the Atlantic weather systems and into a sustained period of unsettled weather.

The long-range forecasts are favouring more of what we have experienced in the first week of September. Occasional bouts of rain, very mild, even particularly warm on occasion, with quite a lot of sunshine.



This picture is likely to be late 1953, and is probably of members of the Coronation Committee. To commemorate Queen Elizabeth II's coronation, funds were raised to create two seats in the village. Originally they were classic teak bench seats with the building works to set this seat on a reduced level within new brick walls. The one on Ditcheat Hill was set on an elevated concrete platform which allowed the field to be stock proof without fencing in front of the seat. It was a major voluntary project that is enjoyed today, albeit the seats have had several replacements and repairs over time.



'The Romantic - The real Life of Castel Greville Ross'

The author, William Boyd, came across 'an unfinished, disordered and somewhat baffling autobiography of Castell Ross (1799-1882)'. He decided there wasn't sufficient information to write his biography, but instead he would incorporate various incidents and historical characters Ross had come across, into a novel.

After an unconventional childhood, Castel enlists as a drummer boy in the army where he sees action at the Battle of Waterloo. Subsequently Ross becomes a lieutenant in the East India's army; an episode that ends badly for him and forces him to leave India. In no hurry to go back to England Ross decides to travel around Europe and Italy, where he



meets Mary Shelly and Byron spending time with both. He has an affair with a Contessa.


Back in England, he writes a very successful book but unfortunately ends up in Marchelsea Prison owing a huge sum of money. At this stage he is 30 years old but after some time his fortunes change as he comes into an inheritance.

The next phase of his life takes place in Massachusetts, America, where he had purchased a farm, married and had two children. The marriage breaks down and Cashel decides to return to England in an attempt to improve his fortunes. Here he is approached by an old army acquaintance who proposes they travel to Africa to discover the source of the Nile with a prize of 5,000 guineas if successful. This venture ends in disaster as Cashel comes into conflict with Burton and Speke who were also seeking the source.

In order to escape the resulting controversy Ross accepts the post of Consul to the republic of Nicaragua where, yet again, he finds that all is not what it seems and he has to flee.

He returns to Italy and, although that is not the end of the novel, it's where he stays. The above describes the bare bones of Ross' very colourful and adventurous life. It's well worth a read.

Harvest at Wraxall Vineyard

We've all enjoyed the sunshine this year — none more than the vines at the vineyard. The long, hot sunny days brought the vines into flower earlier than average, we had no strong winds or heavy rain to affect pollination and veraison, the point at which the black variety grape bunched start to turn from green to black, has happened 2/3 weeks earlier than anticipated. This bodes well for a good harvest, and ultimately good wines — but as I write this we've still got a few weeks to go and anything can happen!



The summer of 2025 hasn't been renowned for much rain and elsewhere in the UK hosepipe bans are in place. Fortunately, the roots of the mature vines go down up to 7 metres and that long, long, wet winter, allied to our heavy clay soil, has kept the vines going through this long hot summer. We planted circa 2000 new vines in May and even those have found good moisture in the soil and have grown well. Water was taken out of our spring-fed reservoir and stored in case of need and we just haven't had to use it.

There's a lot of wasps this year and they do like the taste of grapes! In previous years we've been affected by SWD (Spotted Wing Drosophila) that lay their eggs in the grapes and literally turn the juice to vinegar - but we've now got this under control. Last year there wasn't much food for the birds around (remember that dull, cool summer) -so we had to deal with flocks of Fieldfares hungry for sweet juicy grapes. Hopefully they won't come back this year but some vineyards in 2024 had their crop devastated by birds - our local Buzzards and increasingly the Red Kites help us.



So now we move to harvest. Our vines are cared for by the vineyard team during the year, as advised by our viticulturist – but once we near harvest our winemaker takes over. Grape samples are sent every week for testing and once the acids and sugars are "just right" we get circa 48 hours' notice to gather the picking teams together (please contact us if you want to join in) and get the grapes to the winery – just two hours from picking to juice.

The four different varieties across the vineyard mean four different harvest days, normally spread between mid-September to mid-October, although it could be earlier this year.

The good news is that, with a bit more rain in the coming weeks to fatten up the grapes, 2025 could be a classic vintage for English wine. We will again be making our award-winning Bacchus Reserve, along with our Sparkling wines, and hoping for more "Golds" for Wraxall.

The Natural World

This summer's extraordinary weather was, for many, a welcome change from last year, but extreme weather of any sort is never going to please everybody and farmers have been dealt a particularly hard blow, with virtually no rain at all throughout July and August and record-breaking hot spells. Crops and grassland have suffered dreadfully, leaves have been falling from trees like confetti, and gardeners are not best pleased, but then they hardly ever are, but it has been good for others. Plums, and almost all other species of prunus have done very

well indeed. Some apple species, particularly crab apples, were weighing down branches while commercial apple growers complained of smaller fruit. If you're a forager then you should have benefitted from bumper crops of Blackberries, hips, haws and the prunus species - sloes, bullace and wild plums. Some other berry fruit like raspberries, which have shallow roots, didn't do so well.



What causes these anomalies? Some species require more moisture while others need more sun and, without rainfall, plants needing moisture need deeper roots in order to source moisture from the soil. Other factors come into play as well. The less rain we have, the less nectar the plants can produce and so fewer pollinators will visit the blossoms. Too much rain and any pollen is washed out of the blooms. Too much wind and blossoms are destroyed. The plants and trees which are providing the most fruit this year are those which flowered at the most opportune time in our bizarre weather calendar.



That leads nicely into why plants and trees produce fruit in the first place. They could just produce seeds which are scattered on the wind, and indeed, some do. Sycamore, for example, produces those lovely keys, as they are called, which helicopter to the ground and can be blown some distance from the mother tree. Several other plants have really mastered the craft, with thistles, willowherb and willow producing

light feathery seed, while dandelions have wonderful parachute-propelled seeds which scatter over long distances. All seeds are fruit, as such, but some fruits are fruitier than others, so to speak. Of course, man has had a lot to do with cultivating bigger, sweeter and juicier fruit, but the reason for those juicy fruits

in the first place – is simply to attract fruit thieves. Apart from humans, foxes love blackberries, squirrels harvest nuts, jays collect acorns and, of course in warmer climes, fruit bats eat fruit. It's what happens next which is important.

Foxes digest the blackberries and the seeds are deposited in their waste. Squirrels and jays don't have very good memories and so they forget where they have secreted some of their stashes. Consequently, the nuts and acorns germinate and produce new trees.

Perhaps the least savoury story relates to the consumption of coffee berries, by a small mammal known as the Asian palm civet. The civets simply love the berries and consume them in large numbers, then defecate partially digested

berries containing coffee beans. These are highly prized, and Kofi Luwak, as it is known, is the most expensive coffee in the World. Asian palm civets are traded for just this purpose, being fed on a diet of coffee berries. I think I'll stick with Tesco's Italian blend.



Seeds are remarkable entities though, and can remain viable for hundreds of years, in the right conditions. Kew Gardens have a stock of seeds known as the Millenium Seed Bank, because in the year 2000 they started to collect and curate a library of seeds in order to be able to combat loss of biodiversity. In the ensuing 25 years they have collected 2.5 billion seeds from 100 partner countries, and from over 40,000 species of plants. They keep them in a state of suspended animation, so that, if needs be, they can replace any lost species. It has been hailed by none other than Sir David Attenborough as "Perhaps the most significant conservation initiative ever..."

Not all plants rely on seeds to reproduce, they can send out trailing shoots, which then root and set up as new plants in their own rite. Brambles do it, and so does honeysuckle. If you want a new honeysuckle plant, just place a stone on a trailing shoot, and hey presto! You have a new plant. Even more clever are plants which produce seeds without the need to be pollinated. It's called apomixis, and if I fully understood apomixis, I would explain. It's not just those cunning parachute seeds which make dandelions so successful. They do produce pollen, and can produce seeds as a result, but they don't need to because they can reproduce through apomixis and cover your lawn and garden in brand new dandelions without any help from pollinators.



October Vegetable Garden



Slower growth, less birdsong, colder weather. Soon it's dark before evening begins. What's to like?

Delicious harvests and leek advice

Fortunately, the vegetable garden offers solace, such as winter squash now ripe, cauliflower even purple ones, cabbage, beetroot, radicchio, celeriac and the first parsnips.



Multisown leeks, numbers per clump can be variable Jolant 16th October

It may be worth harvesting leeks now, before there is too much risk of the Allium leaf miner. Last year it was prevalent by November, so if you have not covered your leeks, I would look to harvest any early varieties before the end of October. Jolant is my favourite variety and it's ready now.

On the other hand, the most common leek planting is Musselburgh, a late type. They may be damaged by the fly maggots but still survive, to grow again strongly next March and April.

Plant garlic, broad beans

Now is THE time for starting garlic. Make holes with a dibber and pop in the cloves, then cover with 2-3 cm compost of any kind. Plant the largest cloves from this year's harvest, and depending what variety you plant, they may not appear for up to two months.

Sow broad beans

From late October, sow broad beans to overwinter small, and crop from late spring. Plants need to be not too big by Christmas, in order to survive frost better. You can sow them even until mid-November, either direct or one seed per module cell to transplant in early December.

Composting

Understanding the principles helps you to work out a best method for the size of garden you have. Use a small heap which fills rapidly, and finishes within a few months of first add. The ideal proportion is a quarter brown woody materials, and three quarters green.

For covering soil before winter, compost does not need to be perfectly fine and crumbly. Anything more than half decomposed will work, to then be broken down more by winter weather. Use it unsieved, sometimes a bit lumpy, even with small pieces of wood visible.

New plantings under cover

20th October is last date for transplanting under cover any spaces you have, such as polytunnels and greenhouse. Full them with brassica salads, lettuce, endive, claytonia, and more. Plant them all at 22 cm spacing, for six months of winter harvests.

Somerset Shooting Ground Petition

East Pennard Parish Council are organising a petition regarding the Somerset Shooting Ground If you would like to add your name to the petition please contact the Parish Clerk, Hilary Tripp.

Hilary's email address is clerkeppc@gmail.com or alternatively contact one of the Parish Councillors.

The text of the petition is as follows:

Somerset Shooting Ground lies within Pilton Parish close on the border of East Pennard Parish. Residents of both parishes experience high noise levels from the Shooting Ground fixtures that are held regularly. There are 2 residential properties within 0.5km of the shooting ground, some 15 within 1km, approximately 50 within 1.5km and there are many properties in the villages and hamlets of Pilton, East Pennard, Pylle, Hembridge, Withial, Sticklynch and Steanbow within 2Km. Within 3KM the sound disturbs the residents of Parbrook, Little Pennard, Huxham, and Wraxall.

This petition requests that Somerset Council act to ensure that Somerset Shooting Ground comply fully with all aspects of the Guidance on the Control of Noise issued by the Chartered Institute of Health 2003.

It should be noted that East Pennard Parish Council has written a number of times to both the proprietor and to the Council expressing the concerns of the residents. The proprietor has also been invited to attend a Parish Council meeting but has declined to do so. Such concerns raised by many of the residents in the above villages and hamlets have not been adequately addressed.

It is requested that

All events held at the Somerset Shooting Ground are fully compliant with the Guidance on the Control of Noise issued by the Chartered Institute of Environmental Health in January 2003 and that Somerset Council regularly monitor and take action on all aspects of non-compliance.

2. Minutes of Last Meeting

The minutes of the meeting on 8th May 2025 were approved.

3. Matters Arising

 Cockmill Lane junction – a letter from Chris Smith was read out, complaining about the obstruction and damage from the boulders. It was agreed to move the boulders to the top of the bank and review the results. The clerk to reply to Chris Smith.

4. Financial Report

The footpath invoice was discussed. It was agreed the clerk adopt internet banking if this is more convenient. The invoice of £2,000 for the stiles is to be paid.

5. Glastonbury Festival Donation Spending

Regarding getting a defibrillator, the Village Hall will accept this, subject to the Parish Council paying for the running costs and the installation. It was agreed to pursue this.

6. Planning Applications

i) Evercreech Junction SCC/3854/2021 Section 73 application to vary conditions 2 (approved plans), 3 (noise mitigation) and 4 (night time noise limit) in respect of planning permission reference 2017/3147/CNT (section 73 application to amend condition 2 [approved plans and specification], 3 [noise mitigation] and 5 [dust control] in respect of planning permission 2013/2083 for the construction of an Anaerobic Digestion plant) The council opposed this application as the conditions are there to protect residents and EPPC sees no reason to change them.

Decision: Recommend Refusal

7. Shooting Ground

The petition draft was circulated to Clare Sully and Pilton Parish Council; their comments are awaited.

8. Glastonbury Festival

On the Monday exit from the festival there was gridlock at Hembridge. There were also water supply issues. An October debrief will be pushed for.

9. Village Hall

An update was given regarding the damp problem. Martin Llewellyn is willing to chat to the Trustees regarding the solutions proposed by the contractors. The installation of wifi has been agreed by the Trustees, as has the installation of a defibrillator.

10. The Hunt

An outline of the response from the Police and Crime Commissioner was given. A letter from Angela Pearce was read out. There was a request from the public for a 'No Hunt' zone, as 'other councils do it'. A parish poll was suggested. (Trail) Hunting is legal – it is up to landowners as whether they allow it on their land. It is not up to the Parish Council to decide if the hunting actually done is legal or not. Advice is needed from SALC.

11. Footpaths

Kerry Dodd gave a de-brief of the situation and issues. If the dog and maize issues are not resolved by the Somerset Council footpaths officer, the Parish Council will write to Somerset Council.

12. Kennel Lane

The problems at Kennel Lane and Hembridge have been resolved. Regarding the road flooding from Sunnyside hill, the ditch source may need to be looked at.

13. Correspondence

- Gov.uk emails we need to find out if we can do this ourselves, regarding one council address, rather than doing it by a company.
- A letter from Peter Edmondson regarding the fence by Coombe Lane was read. Adrian Pearse will enquire from Matthew Golledge who constructed it.

'for' or 'against'. And generally, it is easier to be against things than for them! Look at the tendencies of the media, politics and religious disputes.

On October 18th, Anti-Slavery Day, people across the UK will recommit themselves to the fight against modern slavery and human trafficking, one of the great evils of our time. Like William Wilberforce and what we now call historic slavery, we need to fight against the oppression and exploitation of our sisters and brothers today. Abolition is the proper aim of being anti or against. And the challenge is growing with:

- More vulnerable people susceptible to false promises
- Increasingly flexible working arrangements which gives space for criminal agencies to provide goods and services based on exploitation and slave labour
- Police and prevention resources being ever overstretched
- And our own insatiable appetite for cheap products

There is much we need to learn to oppose and abolish but in facing these almost overwhelming challenges we must not neglect what is primary for our Christian witness, the call to notice, reach out, rescue and restore. The call to love, to be for those who are hidden, neglected, hurting and ignored.

In Anti-Slavery Week, give time to thinking how you or your church or home group could better learn how to contribute to the fight against modern slavery. The Clewer Initiative has some amazing resources to help us open our eyes and assist the authorities and reach out towards victims.

But, alongside these prayers and practices, consider how you could go the extra mile in the way of the Good Samaritan. Going beyond the indifference of the priest and the Levite, too busy to stop, notice, reach out, rescue; rather how can we better contribute to establishing systems like the partnership between the Good Samaritan and the innkeeper—systems to provide care and the basis of restoring proper health and opportunities to those whose cries represent the voice of Jesus for those willing to listen.

Be against modern slavery this October, but more, be for those who need our friendship and our partnership.

Dear friends,

Normally we have an Indian summer just as children go back to school, but this year things seem to be a little different. If ever proof of climate change was needed, this year surely provided it. I hope the hierarchy across the pond are beginning to learn some lessons.

The word harvest comes from the Old English word haerfest, meaning autumn or even August, because August $1^{\rm st}$ was traditionally the beginning of the harvest season. On the nearest Sunday to August $1^{\rm st}$, farmers would bring the first gleanings of corn or wheat to the church, as well as a newly baked loaf, so the name for that feast day was originally loaf-mass, eventually becoming Lammas.
